

Annual White Elephant Auction Saturday February 22



Overnight Trip to Globe Friday March 27 — Sunday March 29

The tour will leave the paved parking lot just north of the Sunnyside Cafe in Catalina at about 9:30 AM. We will follow Arizona 77 past Oracle and Mammoth, 36 miles to our first stop at the Aravaipa Creek bridge. This is about where Aravaipa Creek joins the San Pedro river and is the site of several historical events. There are no facilities. Note: our speed will be limited to 45 miles per hour.

Then we will proceed to Winkelman for fuel, break, checkup, and bathrooms. Following this, we will drive through the mostly abandoned mill and smelter towns of Hayden and San Pedro.

Returning to Arizona 77, we will continue north, stopping at the rest area at the top of Pinal pass (5000 ft) for a break and picnic lunch. We will then drive to Globe and the motel check-in. We recommend the Best Western at \$110.77 total per night. Denny's is right next door for late night snacks, and there is free wine tasting right across the street. Alternatively, the Days Inn is across the road, and the rate is \$89.27 per night. Dinner will be on our own at one of several excellent Mexican, Italian, and American restaurants close by. Apache Gold Casino has an excellent seafood buffet starting at 4 pm as well. Miles driven for the day should be 110.

Saturday morning we will take the walking tour of the Old Dominion Mine, mill, and smelter site (1880 to 1931). Walk as much or as little as you like, as it is a self guided tour. Following this we will visit the Besh-Ba-Gowah Archaeological Park and Museum. Lunch will be at La Casita Mexican restaurant. The rest of the afternoon we can visit the many antique shops and historical downtown, including the Gila County courthouse and jail. The Pickle Barrel is the best-known antique shop, and is famous for its Turquoise. Dinner is on your own with choices like Copper Bistro, Bloom (Asian), Judy's Cookhouse, La Casita, De Marco's (Italian) and more. Apache Gold Seafood Buffet is available as well.

Sunday morning we can visit Apache Gold Casino, drive to Coolidge Dam (30 miles), or whatever we decide. Or we can just head home as a group.

Please just call me if you wish to come along. We would love to have you.



Both were made from herringbone weave cloth, but the Motor Coat was made in white, while the Dura-Bilt is khaki which they claim does not easilv show soil.

Hairstyles Dos and Don'ts

By Patti Jones (Taken from Ladies' Home Journal, October 1930)



This article stresses that your coiffure "can do wonders to accent the best points of your face and actually conceal or modify your not so best points." The hair parted in the center will increase the width of your face and also "emphasize irregularity". This style would be becoming if your face is long and slender. A rounded or broad face can be made to look thinner by parting the hair on one side. Which side to part it would depend on which way your hair grows.

A long slim face can wear a very low bang, or hair that is combed very low over the forehead. The shorter the length of the hair on the face, the longer the face appears. Hair curving or waving over the cheeks cuts the face in half and appears to decrease its width. A small tight wave makes features seem very large, "simply because of the contrast between the tight waves and the size of the faces' features. A wide loose wave is almost always more becoming."

Late in 1930, the short "bob" is already passé. Long hair is not in either, but "the smallest and most compact of chignons or softer adaptations of the "bob" are the style." The current hairstyle outlines the head, but the lines are softer and the waves are looser. Those who have long hair should still have a low roll or knot that looks well with a long slim neck.


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Hairstyles Dos and Don'ts (continued)

If your neck is fairly short and thick, it is recommended that you grow the sides first and encourage the hair to grow forward on the cheeks."

"Two things to remember when attending the coiffure clinic, carefully study your hairstyle from all angles in a long mirror, so as not to only see your facial features, but also your whole body." It also went on to state, "The smartest coiffure in the world will not make up for the lifeless uncared-for-hair. Don't neglect the daily brushing and the massage with tonic, nor the thorough shampoo once a month." Can you believe that?

The hairstyle on the left above was worn by a gray-haired woman in Paris. The back is flat and shingled, the sides are long and brushed away from the face. The ends are tucked under the curls at the top of the head. The 3 middle styles show the old and new bob. The hair is parted from the neck to the forehead and brushed toward the cheeks on each side, while a bang falls over the forehead. The style on the right shows someone who has long hair, with an all around roll. The hair is parted on the left and loosely waved.



Jim's technical tip by Jim Cannon, MAFCA Technical Director Keep an Eye on Your Ammeter

Thrifty Henry Ford would only spend the money to put an ammeter in the Model A if he knew it would help you while driving, so get in the habit of keeping an eye on it.

lere's what to look for and what it can tell

Watch for the animeter needle to "twitch" as you pop out the ignition switch or turn the ignition switch to the "on" position. This confirms that the coil is getting power. Now start the car.

After the engine starts and you have it on a fast idle to warm up, check that the animeter is showing a Charge to the battery. If not, find out why.

Look at the anmeter needle when you step on the brakes. It should jump a bit toward discharge (unless you have LED brake lights installed, which draw very little power). It's always good, before you hit raday's crazy, busy roads, to know that your brake lights are working.

working. If you have a voltage regulator in your generator, or if you have an alternator (which has a voltage regulator built in) then you should see the initial battery charge rate on the ammeter steadily drop until it is back to zero in 5 minutes or less. A stock Model A generator will not do this, it has a constant amps output above idle RPM, so you can watch for that while you drive.

above tide krw, so you can warch too that while you drive. Check the ammeter as you turn your headlights on. The change rate to the battery should drop with a generator; the needle should jump around a bit but go back to where it was if you are driving with a good alternator.

As you see, the ammeter can help keep you out of trouble every Model A Day!



Tight Windows?

If you've ever had trouble raising and lowering your windows and never got motivated enough to take off the door panel, grab a coat hanger and straighten it out. Bend a hook in one end, lower the glass, insert the wire between the glass and the sill and hook the wire over the part that needs oiling. Take a can and squirt oil on the wire and it will flow down to the mechanism, lubricating the tight part.
